

Nina Schaffer

1933 -2022

Mrs Schaffer taught me A Level Geography in 1974 – 6. We drove up the M1 and as we went, Mrs Schaffer enthusiastically waved her arms pointing out all the geographical features we passed, both human and physical. At times, it seemed like she was pointing out things on both sides of the road, with no hands on the wheel, though I'm sure that wasn't the case! I enjoyed the course a great deal and, in large part, that was due to Mrs Schaffer's passion for the subject, and her enthusiasm and dedication to her students. We all did well and two of the group went on to study Geography at university, which seems like a great legacy.
